From the Pastor's Pen

Greetings in the name of Christ our Lord!

August is a strange month. It doesn't have the fresh start of January or the joy of the holidays. It isn't quite summer anymore, but it's also not yet fall. The gardens are tired, the heat lingers, and school is just around the corner. In many ways, August feels like an in-between time: a season of transition where we're not entirely sure what to hold onto and what to let go. But that's precisely where God does some of God's best work.

Scripture is full of in-between moments. The Israelites wandered the wilderness between Egypt and the Promised Land. David waited in caves between his anointing and his kingship. The disciples lingered in the upper room between Jesus' ascension and the coming of the Spirit. And we, too, live in the "already but not yet" of God's kingdom-between what is and what will be.

In-between times can feel uncertain, even frustrating. But they can also be holy. Because these are the moments when God shapes us in quiet ways. When there's no spotlight, no resolution, no clear next step-just the daily invitation to trust.

In her book When the Heart Waits, Sue Monk Kidd writes, "The soul often speaks most clearly in the quiet, in the slowing down, in the waiting." Maybe that's the gift of August. It slows us down-and in so doing, teaches us how to listen again.

So if you feel like you're waiting for something-clarity, healing, renewaltake heart. God is with you not just in the destination, but in the inbetween. This might not be the most exciting time of year, but it may be one of the most spiritually fruitful, if we let it be.

Let's be faithful in the waiting. Let's lean into the slowness. And let's remember that even in the in-between times, perhaps especially in them, God is at work.

The Counselor's Corner





From Loneliness to Belonging: Seeking Connection in a Disconnected World

Many clients I see talk about experiencing loneliness. In a world where we have multiple ways to connect, i.e., social media, e-mail, Zoom, FaceTime, telephone, etc., often I hear people describe feeling disconnected, invisible, or having a sense that they are out of place and just don't belong anywhere. Loneliness does not discriminate, and it can feel particularly harsh when someone feels lonely in a place that seems to be synonymous with connection—with family, friends, in community organizations, and even in church.

In the second chapter of Genesis, we read that God recognized that loneliness is troublesome. "Then the Lord God said, 'It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper as his partner." (Genesis 2:18) We were all created to be social beings, to be in relationship, not only with God, but with our brothers and sisters. Even with this Biblical acknowledgement that we need one another, many of us suffer and struggle in silence as we try to carry our burdens alone. We offer excuses that we don't want to bother anyone, or we try to convince ourselves that everyone has their own problems so we should not trouble them with ours. Sometimes we might even find it hard to reach out to someone who could help, or we chose not to, because we question whether or not we would even get a response.

It is important to understand that there is a difference between being alone and being lonely. Perhaps you are an introvert. If so, you understand the need to be alone. Introverts are often good at pretending to enjoy the company of a large crowd, but when such a gathering comes to a close, an introvert needs some alone time to recharge and regroup. Being around people and having to be 'on' is exhausting for an introvert. Conversely, being lonely is not necessarily simply a matter of not being around a crowd. A person who feels disconnected or invisible can be in the midst of a crowd and still feel alone. To avoid feeling lonely, a person must be able to connect, be seen, be valued, and be accepted.

In today's world, we have myriad ways to connect with friends, family, and co-workers. Yet many more people than ever before experience loneliness. Loneliness can result from many of life's transitions—moving to a new city, the loss of a friend or spouse, divorce/ separation, changing jobs/retirement, or sending your children off to school or the workforce. For others, loneliness is the residual effect of emotional wounds—self-perception of being an outsider, mental health issues, or shame. We might tell ourselves, 'If they get to know who I really am, they will not like me.'

There is a powerful antidote for loneliness—community. In the 4th chapter of Ecclesiastes, the portion of the chapter entitled "The Values of a Friend" we read, "Two are better than one, because they have a good reward for their toil. For if they fall, one will lift up the other; but woe to one who is alone and falls and does not have another to help." (Ecclesiastes 4:9-10) This wisdom from over three millennia ago remains true today.

Becoming an incorporated member of a community does not happen spontaneously. Sometimes it may be difficult to find the right community. Some people might find it intimidating to be the newest member and therefore initially on the fringe of an established group. To immerse yourself in a community may require you to be vulnerable and intentional. It requires we extend grace to ourselves and others alike and even a willingness to accept that, for a time, it may be uncomfortable. We can all work to invite others into community. Look for the person you don't recognize that may be sitting alone. Invite someone new into conversation over a cup of coffee. And if you are the visitor to an established community, understand you might have to come back more than once to become fully integrated.

If you find yourself feeling lonely in your current station in life, do not be discouraged.

- Acknowledging your loneliness is not a sign of weakness, rather it is a sign of self-awareness and the first step toward seeking connection.
- The journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step. This ancient proverb is sound advice for someone experiencing loneliness. Take a step outside your routine and comfort zone. Join a Sunday School class. Speak to someone you have seen sitting in the pew close to you. Get involved in service opportunities or social activities that have an open invitation. Moving toward belonging can simply mean showing up.
- No one should be expected to travel his/her journey alone. Maybe you would benefit from a conversation with Pastor Jason. Maybe having a Stephen Minister during a difficult season is appropriate for you. Maybe you need to some talk to me where you will find a confidential, safe place to tackle whatever it may be that is resulting in your feelings of being lonely and disconnected.
- Lean into your faith, not only your faith in God, but your faith in the process. God will graciously meet your where you are, and there are people in this community ready and willing to help you in any way they can.

The promise of the gospel is that we are never truly alone. Jesus experienced deep loneliness—rejected, misunderstood, even abandoned in His final hours—so that we might never be separated from the love of God. In Christ Jesus, we are fully known and fully loved.

My prayer is that SFUMC continues to be a place where every person feels seen, heard, and valued—a place where no one walks alone. Since 2001 the United Methodist Church has promoted itself as a place where people can find "Open Hearts. Open Minds. Open Doors." My experience of SFUMC has been that it is a place guided by the inclusive love of God for each of us and a place where one another's burdens are shared and where grace, concern, and care are abundantly present and freely offered to all. I unequivocally believe that this church family is here to celebrate with you, as well as, to walk with you through life's challenges. Please know that I'm here for you too.



Lighthouse Ministry began just under 2 years ago with an interest meeting in August 2023. We now have members representing at least 4 different denominations and 11 different churches in the surrounding communities. In order to continue to grow this ministry, we recently embarked on a shoe drive. We chose this fundraiser because it didn't require any upfront costs and not only would it benefit us, but it would allow individuals in underdeveloped countries to support themselves. It sounded so easy - we had 2 months to collect 2500 pairs of shoes. That's all we had to do. Once they were collected, we would just rubber band each pair together and place them into bags containing 25 pairs each. Easy, right? There were many days when we questioned our ability to meet our goal (and our sanity) but on July 23rd, a truck pulled away from SFUMC carrying 2,670 pairs of shoes!

Greetings from the Finance Committee!

The financial update through 6/30/2025 is below. While our general contributions were low to budget, designated contributions exceeded \$48,000 for the six-month period. Some of these contributions remain within ministries of our church (Youth Ministries as an example) but others support missions and ministries throughout our community and beyond (such as My Father's House or COPE or the many ministries supported by communion offerings). Our church has a heart for missions! I have learned that many persons are not fully aware of how Designated Contributions work. Designated contributions are earmarked for a particular activity or mission. Except for those that are designated for a specific SFUMC ministry, the money for each is sent to the particular ministry shortly after receipt of the contribution. Designated Contributions for SFUMC ministries (Stephen Ministry as an example) remain in an account until used for that particular activity. If the total is not used before year end, it carries forward to the next year. Those contributions cannot be used for anything other than the ministry designated. In reviewing the summary below, please remember that contributions designated for a particular activity, cannot be used to support general church operations. We are so grateful for your faithful giving, but encourage you to also remember the need that we are experiencing for gifts that support our general operating budget. As of end of June our total general fund operating cash loss for the year exceeded \$58,000. As you consider how grateful you are for what our Church represents to you, please consider how you can help strengthen its financial position.


